

A Tribute to Fr. Gustavo Gutiérrez

Sir, Today the Roman Catholic Church in India and Bengal is powerful as a force of countercultural resistance because of the contributions of the just deceased Peruvian priest, Fr. Gustavo Gutiérrez OP. He single-handedly made the aims and goals of Vatican II possible in the last century through his academic work which later came to be known as Liberation Theology. He did not participate in Vatican II, but history will remember him as the single most important Catholic thinker who shifted paradigms in the last century and continues to inform the life of the Roman Church even today. God sent Fr. Gutiérrez to remind us once again of God's 'hesed' and 'rahamim'. He possessed what the Bible commentator Walter Brueggemann calls the 'prophetic imagination' in Brueggemann's eponymous book. For me, personally, it is as if a light has been snuffed out from this darkling world.
